TEACH EUROPE was launched in 2003 in celebration of the 40 year-anniversary of the Franco-German Elysée Treaty marking the beginning of new relations and friendship between the two countries. Today, the Teach Europe coalition includes many European Consulates and cultural organizations.

TEACH EUROPE offers a series of workshops and seminars to secondary school teachers in the US. It is a unique opportunity for teachers to receive up-to-date information on the European Union and to discover new ways of integrating components of European cultures in classroom activities.



The seminars, led by specialists of the European Union, are open to secondary school teachers of Languages, Social Studies, History or the Arts. Teachers will be exposed to innovative teaching strategies and will have an opportunity to exchange with their peers.

Furthermore the TEACH EUROPE program provides information about the EU, as well as resources, PowerPoint presentations and videos through the [teacheurope.org](http://teacheurope.org) website.

The seminars are planned in accordance with nationwide Continuing Education Units standards, CEUs or Credit Hours will be granted to the participants upon completion of the program.
